Services offered for free

A SPECIALIST indigenous respiratory outreach clinical team will visit Charleville in August as part of a Queensland Department of Health statewide initiative.

Funded through Closing the Gap, a paediatric team from the Indigenous Respiratory Outreach Care program will be in Charleville and Cunnamulla from August 4-6.

IROC project officer Marcus Pedro said the clinics were free.

Mr Pedro said members of the public could attend the clinics on the day or could be referred by health workers or clinicians.

"IROC aims to increase access to specialist respiratory services for rural and remote Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities in Queensland and to raise awareness of respiratory illness, signs and symptoms," he said.

The clinic will set up at CWAATSICH on August 4 for paediatric services and from August 7-8 for the adult clinic, as well as on August 6 at the Charleville Hospital during the morning only.

Griffith Uni helps create arty vision

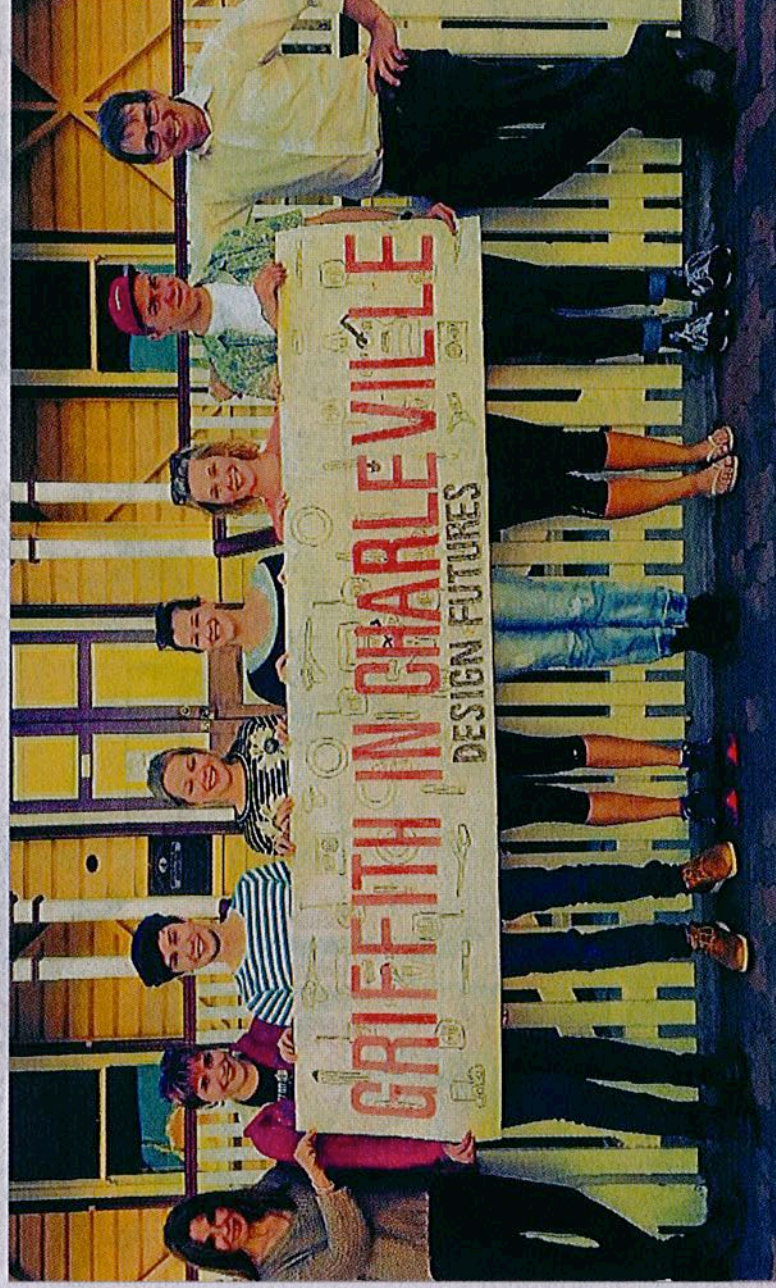

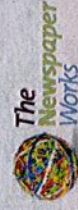
